words would seem calculated to explain that the Coronation Oath need not compromise the King's commitment to a multifaith society, as well as explaining why the King is still required to take the oath – because it is legally required.

The words of the oath to govern his realms and dominions according to their respective laws and customs is unchanged from 1953, apart from the omission of those Commonwealth realms over which the King no longer reigns as monarch.

The words of the King's ecclesiastical oath remain entirely unchanged.

Then the Queen arising out of her Chair, supported as before, the Sword of State being carried before her, shall go to the Altar, and make her solemn Oath in the sight of all the People to observe the premisses: laying her right hand upon the Holy Gospel in the great Bible (which was before carried in the procession and is now brought from the Altar by the Archbishop, and tendered to her as she kneels upon the steps), and saying these words: The things which I have here before promised, I will perform, and keep. The Coronation collect for 2023 differs quite considerably from that prayed for Elizabeth II in 1953. While the 1953 collect asked for 'the Spirit of wisdom and government', the 2023 collect asks for vaguer 'gifts of wisdom and love'. The mentions of the safety of the Church and the monarch's eternal destiny contained in the 1953 collect are omitted.

The Epistle is a different one from the last Coronation, and whereas in 1953 the Epistle was read by a bishop, in 2023 it will be read by the Prime Minister.

The Sung Alleluia takes the place of the Gradual in 1953.

The Gospel, while a different passage from 1953, is read by a bishop in 2023 as it was at the last Coronation.

The Creed, sung in 1953, is omitted.

The Archbishop of Canterbury is presented with the oil, by The Most Reverend Dr Hosam Naoum, The Anglican Archbishop in Jerusalem.

Archbishop of Canterbury: Blessed art thou, Sovereign God, upholding with thy grace all who are called to thy service. Thy prophets of old anointed priests and kings to serve in thy name and in the fullness of time thine only Son was anointed by the Holy Spirit to be the Christ, the Saviour and Servant of all. By the power of the same Spirit, bless and sanctify this oil, that it may be for thy servant Charles a sign of joy and gladness; that as King he may know the abundance of thy grace and the power of thy mercy, and that we may be made a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for thine own possession. Blessed be God, our strength and our salvation, now and for ever. Amen.

Zadok the Priest

Zadok the priest and Nathan the prophet anointed Solomon king. And all the people rejoiced and said: God save the King! Long live the King! May the King live forever! Alleluia! Amen!

The Anointing screen is arranged around the Coronation Chair. The Dean pours oil from the ampulla into the spoon, the Archbishop by the Anglican Archbishop of Jerusalem is a new development.

The erection of an **Anointing Screen** is a new development in 2023, after the anointing of Elizabeth II under a canopy.

The formula of anointing itself is unchanged, as is the Blessing of Anointing

The Anointing

In the mean time, the Queen rising from her devotions, having been disrobed of her crimson robe by the Lord Great Chamberlain, assisted by the Mistress of the Robes, and being uncovered, shall go before the Altar, supported and attended as before.

The Queen shall sit down in King Edward's Chair (placed in the midst of the Area over against the Altar, with a faldstool before it), wherein she is to be anointed. Four Knights of the Garter shall hold over her a rich pall of silk, or cloth of gold: the Dean of Westminster, taking the Ampulla and Spoon from off the Altar, shall hold them ready, pouring some holy Oil into the Spoon, and with it the Archbishop shall anoint the Queen in the form of a cross:

I On the palms of both the hands, saying, Be thy Hands anointed with holy Oil.

II On the breast, saying,
Be thy Breast anointed with holy Oil.

III On the crown of the head, saying,
Be thy Head anointed with holy Oil:
as kings, priests, and prophets were anointed:

Archbishop anoints The King. The King is anointed on Hands, Breast, and Head, with the associated words (sotto voce)

The Anointing

Archbishop of Canterbury: Be your hands anointed with holy oil. Be your breast anointed with holy oil. Be your head anointed with holy oil, as kings, priests, and prophets were anointed. And as Solomon was anointed king by Zadok the priest and Nathan the prophet, so may you be anointed, blessed, and consecrated King over the peoples, whom the Lord your God has given you to rule and govern; in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

The Archbishops and Dean return to the High Altar. The screen is removed to the Shrine. The King moves to the faldstool in front of the High Altar, kneeling. The Archbishop continues with the 'Oil of Gladness' prayer of blessing (sotto voce):

The Sword of Offering

The Jewelled Sword is presented to The Lord President of the Council in its scabbard, it is passed to the Archbishop. It is held up, before the altar. The Archbishop says a prayer.

Archbishop of Canterbury: Hear our prayers, O Lord, we beseech thee, and so direct and support thy servant King Charles, that he may not bear the Sword in vain; but may use it as the minister of God to resist evil and defend the good, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

The Archbishop returns the sword to The Lord President and it is carried to the King. The sword is placed in the King's right hand.

Archbishop of Canterbury: Receive this kingly Sword. May it be to you, and to all who witness these things, a sign and symbol not of judgement, but of justice; not of might, but of mercy. Trust always in the word of God, which is the sword of the Spirit, and so faithfully serve our Lord Jesus Christ in this life, that you may reign for ever with him in the life which is to come. **Amen.**

The King stands. The sword is clipped on the girdle. The King sits.

Archbishop of Canterbury: With this sword do justice, stop the growth of iniquity, protect the holy Church of God and all people of goodwill, help and defend widows and orphans, restore the things that are gone to decay, maintain the things that are restored, punish and reform what is amiss,

The Spurs are traditionally presented without a form of words, but one has been invented for the 2023 service; this is entirely an innovation.

The idea of singing a Psalm during the exchange of Swords is a new one; the use of Greek presumably refers to the King's Greek and Orthodox heritage.

The words 'for the terror and punishment of evildoers, and for the protection and encouragement of those that do well' have been amended in the 2023 prayer over the Sword of Offering to 'to resist evil and defend the good'.

The Archbishop's words of presentation, beyond 'Receive this kingly Sword', are new for 2023.

The prayer following the King's girding with the Sword is unaltered, with the exception of the addition of the words 'and all people of goodwill'.

The major innovation of 2023 is the presentation of regalia by persons other than the clergy; however, the Archbishop of Canterbury continues to pronounce the words accompanying the presentation. The formula for the **presentation of Armills** is significantly truncated, omitting the words 'and also for symbols and pledges of that bond which unites you with your Peoples: to the end that you may be strengthened in all your works and defended against your enemies both bodily and ghostly, through Jesus Christ our Lord.' Similarly, the word 'Imperial' is omitted from the **presentation of the Robe**, as well as the words 'and the Lord your God endue you with knowledge and wisdom, with majesty and with power from on high.'

The prayer of blessing of the Crown remains largely unchanged, apart from the addition of the words 'that he may be crowned with thy gracious favour'.

While the Archbishop presumably joined in acclaiming the Sovereign in previous Coronations, it has not previously been a rubric that the Archbishop says 'God save the King!' as (or immediately after) he brings the Crown down onto the King's head. In all likelihood, this provision is intended to replace the tradition of peers putting on their coronets at this point in the service, which is unlikely to happen in 2023.

The prayer of blessing beginning 'God crown you with a crown of glory and righteousness...' is entirely omitted in 2023.

Grant this, O Lord, for Jesus Christ's sake, our only Mediator and Advocate. **Amen.**

Then the Queen, kneeling as before, shall make her Oblation, offering a Pall or Altar-cloth delivered by the Groom of the Robes to the Lord Great Chamberlain, and by him, kneeling, to her Majesty, and an Ingot or Wedge of Gold of a pound weight, which the Treasurer of the Household shall deliver to the Lord Great Chamberlain, and he to her Majesty; and the Archbishop coming to her, shall receive and place them upon the Altar.

Then shall the Queen go to her faldstool, set before the Altar between the steps and King Edward's Chair, and the Duke of Edinburgh, coming to his faldstool set beside the Queen's, shall take off his coronet. Then shall they kneel down together; and the Archbishop shall say this prayer:

Groom of the Robes, the Lord Great Chamberlain and the Lords that carried the Regalia in the procession (the Dean of Westminster delivering the Orb, the Spurs and Saint Edward's Staff to the Bearers of them as they pass the Altar); and lastly shall go in the Dean.

And, the TE DEUM ended, the people may be seated until the Queen comes again from the Chapel.

The Queen, being come into the Chapel, shall deliver to the Archbishop being at the Altar there, the Sceptre and the Rod to be laid upon the Altar: and the Archbishop shall receive the Queen's Crown and lay it upon the Altar also. Then, assisted by the Mistress of the Robes, and attended by the Lord Great Chamberlain and the Groom of the Robes, the Queen shall be disrobed of the Robe Royal and arrayed in her Robe of purple velvet.

Meanwhile the Dean of Westminster shall lay upon the Altar the Orb, the Spurs and Saint Edward's Staff, having received them from the Bearers of them, who shall then (preceded by the Bearers of the four Swords) withdraw from the Chapel by the same door on the south side and take the places assigned to them in the procession.

The Queen being ready, and wearing her Imperial Crown, shall receive the Sceptre with the Cross into her right hand and into her left hand the Orb from the Archbishop, who having delivered them, shall withdraw from the Chapel and take his place in the procession: and the Lord Great Chamberlain shall do likewise.

Then Her Majesty, supported and attended as before, shall leave the Chapel by the same door on the south side and shall proceed in state through the choir and the nave to the west door of the Church, wearing her Crown and bearing in her right hand the Sceptre and in her left hand the Orb.

And as the Queen proceeds from the Chapel, there shall be sung by all assembled:

The National Anthem

At the end of the procession The King receives a greeting by Leaders and Representatives from Faith Communities (Jewish, Hindu, Sikh, Muslim, Buddhist).

As the King stands before the Leaders and Representatives of the Faith Communities, they deliver the following greeting in unison.

Faith Leaders & Representatives: Your Majesty, as neighbours in faith, we acknowledge the value of public service. We unite with people of all faiths and beliefs in thanksgiving, and in service with you for the common good.

The King acknowledges the greeting, and turns to greet the Governors-General.
